Course Details

Course Overview

This course is designed to provide a comprehensive overview of English phonetics and grammar, aimed at helping learners improve their pronunciation and understanding of basic grammar concepts. The focus on developing good pronunciation and diction will contribute to overall fluency in the English language. Traces of phonetics can be seen in technology in our everyday lives. The recurrent lack of correspondence between the spelling and pronunciation of a word English poses challenge to acquire mastery over English but this course will address common problems and will establish ease in communication in English.

Course Description

This course is divided into four modules, each consisting of three sessions of three hours. The course is designed to improve English language skills, specifically in phonetics and grammar.

The various sounds that make up language, and how they are employed in communication, will all be covered. Also, you will learn the many sentence-building grammatical structures and how they affect meaning.

The foundations of phonetics will be covered first, including the International Phonetic Alphabet (IPA) and the many sounds used in English and other languages. We'll also look at how stress and intonation function in communication and how they might change the way words and phrases are underlibed.

- Discover how intonation and stress play a part in communication and how they can change a word's or a sentence's meaning.
- Understand the relationships between words in a sentence, the various elements of speech, and sentence structure.
- Recognize the various parts of speech and develop your communication skills with each one.
- Improve comprehension abilities in writing, reading, and listening within the context of phonetics and grammar.
- Learn to recognize and employ grammatical forms and structures, such as tenses, gerunds, and infinitives.
- Recognize how dialects and accents affect communication and language understanding.
- Learn how to evaluate and interpret spoken language using phonetics and grammar rules.

Academic Review and Quality Improvement: Diaries provide valuable insights into teaching practices, enabling the department to conduct periodic academic reviews and identify areas for improvements his leads to continuous enhancement in the quality of education imparted.

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Performance Evaluation:Diary entries contribute to the fair and objective evaluation of faculty performance. The recorded teaching methodologies, assessment patterns, and student interactions aid in assessing their effectiveness as educators.

Resource Management:By maintaining diaries, faculty members can optimize resource utilization by planning lessons and activities efficiently. This, in turn, fosters an environment conducive to holistic development and student engagement.

Class adjustment during faculty leave

The students were effectively engaged and continued their learning during the absence of regular faculty members.

To ensure minimal disruption to the students' learning, the department adopted a comprehensive approach that involved engaging students with other qualified faculty members. Highly competent and experienced substitute faculties were assigned to conduct the classes during the leave period. The substitutes were well-versed in the subject matter and had a good understanding of the curriculum.

During the faculty leave, students actively utilized various academic resources available in the department. They made extensive use of the digital library, accessing e-books, online journals, and research materials pertinent to their coursework. The language lab was also utilized for language practice and enhancement, fostering proficiency in written and spoken English. Additionally, students made frequent visits to the department's bookshelves, taking advantage of the diverse collection of literature and reference materials.

Student attendance monitoring and mentoring by class teachers

The English Department has implemented an efficient class monitoring system that involves regular assessments, class observations, and feedback sessions to gauge students' progress. The system ensures that student performance is closely monitored, and appropriate interventions are made when necessary.

2) Slow learner-centric classes:

1. MENTORING

- MENTORING FOR WEAK SUBJECTS: The students were continuously
 mentored regarding their academics. They were motivated and continuously
 encouraged to seek help from the teachers of the subjects in which they are weak.
- ENCOURAGEMENT TO PARTICIPATE IN ASSOCIATION AND CULTURAL ACTIVITIES: The students were constantly encouraged to participate in all the co-curricular and inter-class events to help them develop selfconfidence. One of the special students is also a member of the Theatre Club of the department.
- MID SEM RESULT ANALYSIS: Result analysis of Mid-semester exams of the special students was done separately to know their performance. It was found that compared to the first year, the second-year students fared better.

In the weekly departmental meetings issues related to these students were discussed.

An effort was made to bring them together to study core papers on campus with assistance from teachers and a few senior students(supplemental learning) who were good at the subject. It was observed that this group study helped them in looking at each other's notes and getting their doubts cleared. Buddies were identified from their own classes to help them with any doubts regarding the subjects or any other thing. They became friendly with their seniors during meetings and so took help from them too. At the end of each semester their scores in all subjects were taken note of and they were advised and helped accordingly. Students who had attendance issues were constantly monitored and mentored and helped to sort out the same.

2. ORIENTATION PROGRAMMES FOR FIRST YEARS

A ten-day departmental-level orientation for the first semester BA English students was organized with a special timetable before the commencement of regular sessions. The main

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objective was to orient the students to KFASC academic culture with a focus on presentation and writing and referencing skills.

On September 05, 2022 the first-year students were given a college-level induction program in the main auditorium along with the PTA gathering. Here the students were briefed about the rules and regulations of the department with respect to dress-code, discipline, attendance, the various clubs, associations, and other activities. This was clubbed with the Fresher's "welcome program" organized by the senior students.

The workshop witnessed active participation from students of the English Department, who expressed keen interest in understanding diverse career avenues beyond their field of study.




They actively engaged in all activities and demonstrated exceptional communication skills during group discussions and mock interviews.

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EXTENSION ACTIVITIES 2022-23

Activity 1: Community Survey Initiative

On June 17, 2022, fifth-semester students of Department of English conducted a community survey in Ward 31, Kizhakkekundu Panchayath, to identify community needs, challenges, and opportunities for collaboration. The survey, designed with input from academic experts and community leaders, targeted diverse community members and collected data through offline, online, and in-person interactions. The survey aimed to understand educational and skill development requirements, evaluate interest in community activities, and explore potential collaborations.



Outcome: The results highlighted key community needs, educational levels, willingness to participate in activities, and potential areas for joint projects, fostering stronger community-college connections.

Activity 2: Community Engagement Program for Children

On July 20, 2022, third-semester students of Department of English conducted a program for children in Anganwadi 1 and 2 of Ward 31, Kizhakkekundu Panchayath. The program included storytelling, arts and crafts, outdoor games, and interactive learning. Objectives were to make learning enjoyable, develop social and emotional skills, enhance language and communication, spark creativity, encourage physical activity, and create a sense of belonging.



Outcome: The program enhanced social, emotional, and communication skills among children, increased creativity and physical activity, and created a sense of belonging and community for the children.

Activity 3: Book Drive to Promote Literacy

On November 25, 2022, first-semester students of Department of English organized a book drive to promote literacy in Kizhakkekundu Panchayath. Objectives included encouraging reading, providing knowledge, improving reading skills, offering diverse books for all ages, and highlighting literacy's importance. The methodology involved assessing community literacy needs, partnering with local schools, collecting books, sorting them by genre and age, and organizing a distribution event.



Outcome: The initiative distributed books to various age groups, promoting literacy, enhancing reading habits and skills within the community, and providing valuable resources to those lacking access to books.

Activity 4: English Conversation Circle

On January 20, 2023, the Department of English at Kottakkal Farook Arts and Science College organized an English Conversation Circle led by fourth-semester students. The event aimed to enhance language proficiency, boost confidence, facilitate cultural exchange, and foster community cohesion. Activities included group discussions, role-playing, and language games.

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Outcome: The event improved English fluency among participants, strengthened community ties, and received positive participant feedback to refine future workshops.

Activity 5: Community Cultural Exchange Fair

On March 6, 2023, the Department of English at Kottakkal Farook Arts and Science College held a Community Cultural Exchange Fair led by second-semester students to foster cultural understanding and appreciation. The event featured cultural exhibits, performances, and interactive activities like language exchanges and storytelling.





Outcome: The fair enhanced enturned appreciation, strengthened community cohesion, and successfully celebrated diversity and unity with 42 participants from Ward 31, inspiring future cultural events.


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Department of English Departmental activities (2022-2023)

1.Commemorating PB Shelley

The English Department organized a program titled "Commemorating PB Shelley" on August 4, 2022, in the seminar hall. The event included an inaugural session led by the Head of the English Department, featuring a welcome address and an introduction to the life and works of Percy Bysshe Shelley. Aimed at celebrating Shelley's contributions to literature, the event offered a platform for discussions and exploration of his themes and motifs. It featured a paper presentation session where students discussed various aspects of Shelley's poetry, followed by a Q&A session, and a quiz competition for BA English students, led by faculty member Mrs. Amina Murshida. 2.Confluenza-22: Cultural Programmes

The English department organized "Confluenza-22," a series of cultural programmes held on August 17, 2022. The event aimed to provide a platform for students to showcase their talents and skills while promoting cultural diversity and fostering a love for the English language. Activities included a successful enactment of William Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet by final year undergraduates, along with a spell bee competition, extemporization, storytelling, poem recitation, and funanza. Winners received prizes and certificates, enhancing their language skills, confidence, creativity, and computational straiges.

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3. Commemorating T. P. Rajeevan

On November 4, 2022, the English and Language Departments organized a program to honor Indian novelist and poet T. P. Rajeevan. Held in the seminar hall at 10:30 am, the event featured a screening of the Malayalam film Paleri Manikyam: Oru Pathirakolapathakathinte Katha, adapted from Rajeevan's novel. Sreenath M, Head of the English Department, introduced Rajeevan's life and contributions to literature. The objective of the program was to pay tribute to Rajeevan, celebrate his literary achievements, and provide insights into the adaptation of his works into cinema



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




4. A Seminar on "Reading as an Act of Protest in Post- Truth Era"








5. A Seminar on "The Impact of Magical Realism in Latin American Literature"
